What a gorgeous Spring term it has been full of fun and new learning – our learning balloons are HUGE!

We started the term learning about Dr Jane Goodall. We soon noticed how she challenges herself as a scientist. We discovered how brave and resilient she is, determined to pursue her dreams and work with chimpanzees studying their behaviour in the wild. We made links to Jane's determination and our own application to learning, pushing our learning balloons in our classroom zones to be our very best. Just like Jane! We have also linked our character value 'What does it mean to be trusted?' to that of the Big Bad Wolf in The 3 Little Pigs. As authors, we told and retold the story – learning it is a traditional tale meaning a story from the past shared again, and again. As authors, we selected our favourite moment from the story and using our phonics knowledge, wrote a sentence independently using Fred Fingers to support our spellings. As we explored this theme, we decided the Big bad Wolf might not be so bad after all... maybe he is just lonely? Or wanting some new friends? If that's the case... he's come to the right class! A room full of kind and happy friends and learners! Well done Reception class family on a wonderful Spring Term – we are so proud of you.

I hope you all have a wonderful break and when we return we will begin our geography enquiry, comparing what life is like in Devon compared to living in London!










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The half-term started with a design and technology focus, looking at designing, building and evaluating a pop-up book with moving mechanisms, including a lift-the-flap, a box fold and a mouth fold. This was a great a great opportunity to put our values into practice, as at first we found the folding, cutting and sticking for the mechanisms tricky and we had to really persevere and learn from our marvellous mistakes. But, like with most things that are tricky at first, if you work at them and constantly reflect, you end up being successful. The construction of the books proved a roaring success and we added our own creative stories to them, inspired by a 'Hawaiian party' Exciting Writing.

The attention then shifted to history, looking at the life of Sir Francis Drake and trying to answer the question, 'Was Sir Francis Drake a pirate?' . This was a fascinating learning experience, one which everyone really enjoyed. What was really lovely was to see was how excited everyone was to find out more, exploring the Golden Hind in Brixham at the weekends. Their business must have been booming! We learnt all about Drake's life and his achievements and ended the experience writing and performing a persuasive speech explaining whether we though Drake was or was not a pirate. Great work everyone!





Year 3 have had a cracking half-term! We started off with our history enquiry about the Roman invasion. We learnt about the rise of Queen Boudicca, and what led her to stand up to the Romans. We asked the question: What did the battle of Watling Street tell us about Roman rule in Britain? We explored the meaning of chronology and we had an exercise outside where we made a timeline to the Neolithic era of the Stone Age. We used the scale of Icm= one year. The children learnt a lot about the concept of history over time as they labelled when the Roman invasion began. We learnt about bias as well as secondary and primary sources of information. The children wrote a detailed piece of about the Iceni tribe and the Romans, including the final battle.

Our second enquiry has been the subject of Religious and World Views. We have been learning about Judaism and have been studying the concept of 'belief'. The children have really enjoyed learning about Passover and other celebrations. A big thank you to Danny Yank, for giving up his time to be grilled by the children! Finally, let's not forget how we developed our oracy skills on World Book Day as we dressed up and recited poetry!







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Year Four

This half term has seen a lot of adventure as we have had the opportunity to visit Shaldon Beach for our beach school experience. During these sessions, we have collected litter, made observations about our surroundings, thought about gratitude and made sculptures. We have had the most amazing time at beach school and are truly grateful for the opportunity. As well as that, we have embarked on a journey that has explored the Battle of Hastings, building on our Vikings learning in the Autumn term. During this enquiry, we learnt about what caused the Battle of Hastings and what the events leading to the battle were. We finished our enquiry by writing a non-chronological report about how William of Normandy conquered England. Year 4 were absolutely fascinated by this experience. Following that, we moved onto Religion and World Views Education where we have learnt about some key aspects of Hinduism. We have developed our skills by thinking about how our beliefs and values can impact our communities and the world around us as well as learning about how some of the key aspects of Hinduism could be both similar and different to the way we live. As a whole, we have had another busy but enjoyable half term in Year 4 and I can't believe we will be welcoming the summer term!





Year Five

Year 5 have had an excellent half term. We began our history enquiry with the compelling question, "What were the key differences between Cortés and Montezuma?" The pupils delved into the fascinating world of the Aztec civilisation and the Spanish Empire's invasion, led by Hernán Cortés. Through this enquiry, the children gained valuable historian skills by investigating reliable sources, understanding bias, and appreciating chronology. I was particularly impressed with their independence in researching and evaluating various sources to provide reasoned answers to our central question. They demonstrated commendable honesty in their quest to minimise bias in their findings. In addition to history, we explored a Religion and World Views enquiry centred around the question: "Why is the Torah so important to Jewish people?" This experience encouraged our students to show respect and tolerance while discussing different beliefs. We also touched upon the concept of interpretation, highlighting the importance of recognising that everyone may perceive things differently and hold unique opinions. In French, our lessons revolved around everyday communication in France, particularly regarding shopping and currency handling. The children enjoyed enhancing their pronunciation and listening skills through vocabulary quizzes, adding an element of fun to their learning experience.

Looking ahead to next term, we will shift our focus to geography. The children will examine migration and the push/pull factors associated with climate change in south-east Asia. I hope all of the children have a brilliant Easter break and a well-earned rest after all of their hard work this half term.











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In Religious Education and Worldviews, we've explored the contrasting perspectives of creationism and the theory of evolution. We discussed how different religions explain the origins of the world, and considered the scientific evidence supporting evolutionary theory. We encouraged respectful discussion and critical thinking.

To round off a busy and productive half term, we are thrilled to be hosting a Fairtrade coffee morning for our parents. We will be serving a delicious range of Fairtrade teas, coffees, and sweet treats, supporting ethical trade and enjoying a moment of community together.



Throughout March, our brilliant chef Sam has been preparing a range of delicious plantbased snacks for the children to try out.

Every Friday, there has been a selection of different fruits and vegetables to sample, with the aim of introducing children to new and exciting food.

Sam has been busy chatting to the children about the samples they liked the most, and we will incorporate their feedback into planning our next menu.

Our Year Six 'Health Heroes' have done a marvellous job in helping out the younger children and encouraging them to try something new!
