
Well done everyone in Year 1 for such a terrific year!

The children have worked collaboratively in each learning enquiry, co-constructing, and building on each other's ideas and thinking and ultimately deepening their knowledge and understanding. The children have also made such clever links across learning areas. As geographers, reflecting on our precious planet and the effects of climate change which then inspired us as artists to recycle magazines and use our artistic skills to create a whole-class collage to display in a professional gallery! As scientists, learning how to classify animals in different ways and understanding the important role of a food chain. As historians, learning about chronology and the inspiring attitudes of the Wright brothers and how they changed our world. This inspired us as designers to try out the plan, do, review cycle, and develop our stamina and resilience knowing that powerful learning comes from making mistakes in design technology. Also, who would have thought that someone from Shaldon was actually on board the Titanic working as an engineer?! Our historical enquiry helped us learn what has changed in our World as a result of the Titanic tragically sinking.

So much learning. So much fun!

Year 3 have reached the end of their year by studying science and geography. As scientists, they have learnt all about the process called photosynthesis where plants make their own food from, water, sunlight and carbon dioxide. We also learnt more about a process called transpiration, which is how water is transported from the roots to the leaves. This happens because of a fascinating process called transpiration.

Year 3 have also been swimming in the Summer term at Devon Valley. They have been learning a range of techniques including front crawl, back stroke and star floats. The class have all put an incredible amount of effort into their swimming lessons and their behaviour outside of school has been superb! Well done Year 3!

We have had a great year this year in all of our enquiries and I would like to say a massive 'thank you!' to all the help and support that we have had from our parents throughout the year.










We have had a fantastic last term in Year 4! We kicked off the term with a DT enquiry where we made compasses. This was definitely messy, but amazing fun and the children developed some fantastic knowledge and skill surrounding both DT and science.



Throughout the term, the children also had the opportunity to go to The Mix festival at Killerton House (albeit it very hot!), as well as partaking in more local trips like our trip to the Ness. Summer also meant an amazing sports day and summer fair- what a term! Thank you for all the learning and the fun this term Year 4- I look forward to having you as Year 5s!







Learning Enquiry

As always, we have had a busy half term in year 5! The children have completed two enquiries: geography and science. For both, we have been developing our understanding of citizenship and in particular, our character values of compassion, empathy and drive. Furthermore, for both, the children have learnt about a new thinking tool – the 'Y' map – which has helped them to plan their writing.

In the former, the children completed a local study, focussing on how the physical features of Teignmouth have affected human activity. In particular, they have focussed on understanding how this happened during the Victorian era, when seaside towns experienced an increased number of holiday makers. To begin, the children deconstructed the WAGOLL, which was a diary entry from a Victorian girl, who was on her first holiday and her first time out of London, visiting Blackpool. This gave the children a good understanding of what they needed to complete at the end of the enquiry, except their tourist was visiting Teignmouth. In this text, the children needed to demonstrate empathy as they had to understand how these tourists would have felt leaving the city and seeing the sea for the first time. Then, using their reading skills, the children had to decipher the difference between human and physical features, sorting them and understanding those which are present in Teignmouth. Together, we picked which of these features would have had the most human impact and why. Using our map reading skills, we found these features on an OS map and planned our fieldwork in Teignmouth, including the route that we were going to take, using our map reading skills.

Whilst we were out in Teignmouth, the children gathered descriptive phrases at our points of interest and took photographs to show what these particular places on the map looked like. When we returned to school, the children developed these descriptions and included them in their own diary entry. I was blown away by the children's empathy and use of language to create imagery, in their writing.

Currently, the children are working on their second, scientific enquiry, considering how gravity works in our solar system. So far, the children have learnt about four key forces: gravity, friction, air resistance and water resistance. They have designed their own investigations from a list of equipment, to test and explain these theories. Next, we are going to focus in on gravity, including the consideration of how the position of the moon in relation to the position of the earth creates low and high tide. The children's outcome will be a Dorling Kindersley style information page on their scientific learning and understanding.

















It has been a very busy half term for Year 6! We have begun our new enquiry called "Have we always looked like this?" where we have been studying inheritance, adaptation and evolution. We have spent time looking at what we inherit from our parents and what traits are caused by the environment. We have studied how different animals adapt over time to be better suited for their environment. Year 6 have once again had the chance to take part in the 'Youth Speaks' competition led by the Rotary club and came up with some amazing topics to choose from. Thanks to previous years' fundraising, Year 6 have had the chance to qualify as sailors at the Teign Corinthian Yacht Club, spending four days with some amazing instructors learning how to sail. We then decided to try and raise some money to help the next year's Year 6 class enjoy the same sailing course. We were given £5 each by FOSS to create a business plan. Ideas ranged from car washes, cake sales and resin book marks. We were able to raise an amazing £530 in out first go and hope to do the same in our second business fair. With sports day, the residential trip and leavers assembly to come, it will continue to be a busy end to the year!
