#### **Reception Update**

The new term is well under way with all the children settling in extremely well at Shaldon. They are all forming or re-establishing friendships and are following the routines whilst exploring the indoors and outdoors of their new learning environment.

The children have started with great enthusiasm for their learning which is very positive. They all look very smart in their school colours, thank you. Our learning this term has been all about exploration answering the question of 'Why do people choose to explore?' The children have been learning all about the job of a paleontologist, they have been exploring the world of bones and fossils. The children in Reception can now explain how important paleontology is, they can tell you what they have discovered. We recreated our own fossil dig area and will be making our own dinosaurs using bones.



#### **Teachers Rock Youth Choir**

Fifteen of our choir children have started rehearsing after school, as part of the Teachers Rock® Youth Choir.

Coming up at the end of November, our Teachers Rock® Youth Choir children will perform in Exeter Cathedral, as part of an exciting massed youth choir, alongside over 200 primary and secondary school children from all over Devon and Somerset, along with Devon and Somerset adult educators of Teachers Rock®.

Teachers Rock® is a flagship vocal learning platform which aims to inspire, develop, educate and empower

people of all ages, embracing cultural diversity and giving them a route to building confidence for personal development.

For more than a year, children from our school choir have participated in Teachers Rock® Youth Choir events, ranging from concerts in Exeter Cathedral, Exeter University, Armed Forces Day in Plymouth, a CD recording and launch concert, a music video recording session and an audition for Britain's Got Talent. There are more exciting opportunities planned for the future.

#### **Communty Arts Garden**

In just over the six weeks summer holidays, the Guerrilla Gardening Group transformed a rundown and unused area next to Alexandra Terrace into a community arts garden.

The gardening group was started by Tegan Comer's (Year 4) dad, mum and two other families. This small group of three adults and three children worked very hard to create a fenced off childrens area, two bedding areas and a number of planters, made from stacked tyres on the themes of lighthouses and minions. Children in the neighbourhood were given MDF figures of butterflies, dragonflies and bumblebees to decorate which were also used to decorate the planters. They are now awaiting the delivery of a Peacock mosaic, which has been created with a group of local retired people especially for the garden. Two local artists, including Laura Wall have also been invited to contribute pieces for the garden.



The garden project has raised a lot of local interest and support and the group have been supported and thanked by the Chairman of Teignbridge council, the Major of Teignmouth and a group of local councillors.

The groups' work has not stopped just at creating the garden they have also cut back hedges, cleared the gutters of the road improving parking and access and their next project is to clear the back lane at Bitton Avenue so there is better access for all. Congratulations to all those who have taken part and brought the local community together in this worthwhile project that has really made a difference.

# Visit from Clive Pig: author & historian story teller

What a treat we had when Shaldon school had a visitation from the historian story-teller- Clive Pig. Classes 1, 3,4 and 5 were lucky enough to meet Clive Pig who supported their learning journeys on exploration.

In classes 3 and 4 he shared his exciting tales of the Vikings. Dressed in a true to life Viking costume, he entered the room with shield in hand, ready to share sagas all about adventures past.

Mesmorised, the children sat listening to tales about giants and elves, gods and goddesses, being taken on explorations on long boats whilst chanting traditional songs along the way. He cleverly brought the past alive with his wonderful energy and role play while all the time imparting knowledge and giving opportunities for children to develop their curiosity.

After a fun packed session of knowledge through story telling the children then had a chance to use their imagination and develop their own Viking sagas. The only rule was the facts had to be true. Hence, a few alterations had to be made! The children had a fantastic time developing their stories accompanied by props and sound effects. They finished the morning by performing their work to one another which was thoroughly enjoyed by all.

It was a truly fun packed morning which the children won't forget in a hurry.











At an impressively early hour in the morning, Year Three and Four climbed aboard their coach for a long and arduous journey, deep into the wilds of Dorset.

After many hours of I spy, they arrived at a fairly nondescript school in a sleepy village not unlike the one they'd left. Once off the coach, they climbed the hill and soon left the 21st century behind. Through the gates at the top of the lane was another world entirely. First the stone age and then, all of a sudden, they were in the age of the Vikings and Saxons.

Year Three were housed inside a full size longhouse and Year Four were based in an enormous Saxon roundhouse. Each year group split into three groups and spent the day at work, making and doing many things just as the people of the time would have.

Year Three practised their archery (with wooden arrows), wove some willow strips to make some mini hurdles and tried on some Viking armour back at the longhouse. Meanwhile, Year Four were being put to task with tough manual labour. They ground their own grain to make flour, stretched and scraped animal skins to turn them in to leather and hammered away at the forge to create their own knife.

To round off a successful day living as Vikings, Year Three unwound by playing some traditional games in the sun, whilst Year Four enjoyed the bread they had ground the flour for, kneaded together and cooked on an open fire. The journey back was one which should be forgotten for many reasons but, sufficed to say, everyone made it back to Shaldon tired but nonetheless content at a good days' work.

#### **Forest School**



Year Six have been exploring the woods on the ness in their forest school sessions this half term. We have focused on survival and exploring skills. They have had a go at fire lighting, testing different tinder, making cordage, map making, following trails and sending Morse code messages, sneaking games and making their own assault course, water filtering, den building and of course making hot chocolate using the Kelly kettle. Their enthusiasm and creative approach

enabled them to overcome many issues, testing different methods and approaches and using excellent communication skills to listen to the ideas of others. Their ingenuity and teamwork was especially apparent in the den building session, where so many creative solutions where found for the same brief. They also managed to find time to set up and test some rope swings. Its been a pleasure to work with year 6!
