One small step for man, one giant leap for

The summer term in Year 1 launched off with a fun-filled space day, getting us all excited about our new Learning Journey question: When and why did people travel to the moon? What an exciting way to start such an exciting new enquiry!

We have been working as historians, looking back at the time of the 1969 moon landing. We thought about what life was like then, compared to life now. We plotted this momentous historical event on a timeline, along with our births and those of our families, to help us understand when exactly the moon landing occurred.

For the first time this year, we now have our own individual journals to record our work in. We are taking responsibility (Flourishing) to ensure the work in these books is the very best it can be. They are looking spectacular already!

Our final outcome is to write a detailed, knowledge-rich recount of the moon landing. We will be showing off both our in-depth knowledge of the story and also our ever-improving writing skills. We are all so proud of the amazing progress we've made so far in Year 1.

To start off the summer term, Year 3 have been exploring what it means to be a historian and learning all about the Roman invasion of Britain. We have conducted our own research and learnt how to take high quality notes from secondary sources of evidence - something that was made or written after the events took

place. Initially, we discovered who the Celts were and what life was like in Britain before the Roman invasion. Then, we learnt about the different invasions of Britain that took place between 55 BC and 43 AD when Emperor Claudius was

finally able to establish a Roman presence in the British Isles. We then went on to learn about Boudicca's rebellion in 60 AD which almost caused Emperor Nero to abandon his conquest of the country before finally learning about the Roman legacy that was left behind after the collapse of the Empire in 410 AD. On the 16th May, Year 3 had a Roman experience day where we dressed up and spent the day

immersing ourselves in Roman culture, knowledge and their number system! We all thoroughly enjoyed this day and learnt much more about the Roman Empire.

After our work on Romans, the class spent some time looking at programming microbits and at improving our skills at publishing work by using Microsoft Sway. The children have learnt how a program can be created for a purpose and also how they can share documents and work collaboratively.

We also visited the library in Teignmouth to learn more about our local amenities and how we can borrow books for free from the amazing library service that is right on our doorstep!







#### **Library Visit**

The children enjoyed a visit to the library, where they participated in the secret book quest trail. They were presented with a box that had appeared in the library overnight. However, this box couldn't be opened as it was locked with a secret code, which the children needed to crack. Using their knowledge of the library, the children were able to complete their challenge successfully, by working as a team! It was really great to see so many of the children excited about exploring and choosing new books. Thank you to Teignmouth Library for having us!

#### **Enquiry**

In year 5, we have been focusing on the concept of chronology in our historical enquiry. We have thought about our learning in terms of a magnifying glass. By this, we mean that we started off looking at the big picture of ancient civilisations. This timeline contained many bars to show the different time period starting and end dates, therefore making it very easy to understand the length of time that they lasted. Form this, the children were able to interpret and compare their findings. We then focussed a little deeper, looking specifically at the Aztec era on this timeline. Although it was a relatively short time period, clearly there were many events that shaped their legacy. From their reading, the children were able to pull out the key details and place these on an Aztec specific timeline. Interestingly, this timeline wasn't made up of bars as they were concentrating specifically on standalone events. Finally, the children dug deeper again to learn about what Montezuma II did in his lifetime as it is his biography that they are writing. From conducting their own research, the children were able to place some of his key life events on a timeline, where the start and end years were much smaller in comparison to those use on the ancient civilisation timeline. Interestingly, some of his life events lasted many years – such as the length of time that he was emperor - and so this was illustrated as a bar, whereas other events were just stand alone on his timeline. By taking such care and time to understand these events, the children have been able to learn so much about this period of history. Their next step is to expand these details further in Montezuma II's biography.















### ACE Music Project


Year 5 have been lucky enough to be selected to participate in the ACE music project. In their first workshop, they enjoyed some singing with our visitors.






