Year 1

Learning how to be the best learners

In Year 1 this half-term we have been thinking about what it means to be a great learner. We talked about what school means to us and why school is important. We set long-term goals and medium-term targets and agreed, collectively, that we wanted to be the very best we could be, in all that we do this year.

As part of this learning, we used our metacognitive (thinking) tool to create a Good / Bad Plan, listing all of the things a great learner would do, and over the course of the first few weeks we tried so hard to put that plan into practice.


We also looked at how we could make changes to our work to make it better and how we can use feedback

we applied this initial work to art and worked towards producing a printing masterpiece, inspired by Andy Warhol's 1964 hibiscus flower piece. We decided that colour played a big part in making Warhol's work special so we looked at how primary colours can be mixed together to create bright, bold secondary colours that reflect positive feelings. We then looked at how we can use the skill of printing to replicate the grass-like effect Warhol created in the background of his famous piece, along with four striking coloured flower prints.



Year 2 have been expert geographers exploring the enquiry question – has climate change got anything to do with me? In order to unpick this line of enquiry successfully, we needed to develop our geographical skills of asking and answering questions about our precious planet - and wowsers, did the children succeed! Year 2 have shown great knowledge and understanding of what climate change is and how we all play an important role in looking after our Earth. Once we became familiar with the 7 continents and 5 oceans, we headed to the Arctic and saw how the polar bears are losing their habitat due to the ice melting because of the Earth heating up. We explored the consequences of this, such as polar bears exploring nearby towns to search for food. We then needed to present our knowledge of Greenhouse gases to Professor Bailey, who was wondering how the Earth was heating up and what the description 'greenhouse' actually meant? The children discussed how "fossil fuels, fumes, pollution are getting trapped in the atmosphere – keeping the World hot". Greta Thunberg became a source of inspiration as we reflected on her thoughts and ideas of how to protect our Earth. We discovered so much! Inspired by this and her emotive speeches to world leaders, the team of Year 2 geographers then wrote, rehearsed and performed a podcast to share with families. They spoke with knowledge, understanding and passion. The feedback they received was absolutely incredible and demonstrated that their podcasts made an impact and helped to protect our precious planet. What an impressive team of expert geographers!











This half term, Year 3 have been working on a couple of different enquiry questions and have been discovering first-hand how different rocks can be classified as well as how they can use charcoal to capture a 3D image.

In our science, the children had to learn how to observe similarities, differences and

changes between different rocks in order to classify them by their properties. At the beginning of the enquiry, the children were sorting rocks by their shape, colour and even smell! However, by the end of our enquiry, children in Class 3 had learnt how to test the permeability and the durability of the rocks alongside being able to classify them based on their formation.

In art, we have been studying how to vary tone by using charcoal. The children have learnt to smudge, create shapes without outlines, show light and dark and use a rubber to create highlights. Half way through the enquiry, we were visited by Mrs Spires who spent an afternoon with us on the field teaching us how to make our own charcoal! It was a brilliant afternoon and it was fascinating to learn how the charcoal we were using in our art was made in the first place.








We have just completed our history enquiry 'Was Alfred the Great a Democratic Leader?'. The children have acquired so much knowledge through collaborating with their friends and independently researching. They have just created a non-chronological report on the Anglo Saxons, Alfred the Great's life, and their own opinions on the enquiry question. Mrs Geeves and Miss Stevens are so proud of everything they have achieved this half term, and the children are too!







Year 5

The children in Year 5 have really enjoyed starting to learn how to play the pBone. It has been incredible to watch their skills developing and their excitement and engagement bloom each week! We are very much looking forward to the next lessons after half-term, and show-casing their learning in an informal performance at the end of the 10-week set of lessons.













Year 5 has had a fantastic residential trip to Pixies Holt! The children were brilliant, displaying our school values and becoming even closer friends to each other. They have learnt not only about the geography and history of Dartmoor, but also about themselves. It was impressive to see the children showing drive and determination to carry on and to their best during the team tasks, weaseling and climbing activities. They also had lots of fun and were able to enjoy a dip in the river!

















Royal Albert Memorial Trip

As part of our Year 6 enquiry about the Second World War, we travelled up to Exeter by train to visit the Royal Albert Memorial Museum. While there, we had the chance to dress up in authentic home front clothes and investigate artefacts from the time - gas masks, ration books, bomb casings. We then learnt about living through the Blitz and experienced what it was like to squeeze into an Anderson bomb shelter. What an amazing day!





Year 6 Sports Crew

One of the responsibilities that children take on as they move into Year 6 is to become members of the Sports Crew. They help set up games for younger year groups to take part in, demonstrate excellent behaviour and hopefully

become role models for these children. Children are also in charge of keeping the PE shed tidy - a particularly daunting task! They have done brilliantly so far and have shown the drive to give something back to the school community.





BeeNetball

The BeeNetball Festival run by Dartmoor School Sport Partnership took place at TCS with a rotation of activities where the children developed new skills and played non-competitive games.



Forest School

Forest school started up again this week and children have enjoyed going up to the Ness woodland and being part of nature. We played some games, explored the woodland and learnt how to build shelters. As we continue learning about survival skills, we will look at fire-lighting, water purification and basic camp cooking.





The Helen Foundation

Our Year 2 children were lucky to work with MED Theatre developing their skills in drama and performance. The workshop was supported by The Helen Foundation.

The drama workshop focused on a story relevant to the local area of Shaldon based on the The Earl of Totnes.

A story that involves a race on horses, a crashing sea, a feast, a devil and people being turned to stone, and includes locations very close to Shaldon such as Haccombe. Using this local story as inspiration, MED Theatre took the children on a journey of exploring the different elements within the story, and how to turn these into performance - the different characters, the plot and how to create a sense of the space were explored.

The children had a fantastic day and thoroughly enjoyed working with MED Theatre developing their performance skills. It was wonderful to welcome theatre practitioners into school and to see the children working collaboratively.


School Council
